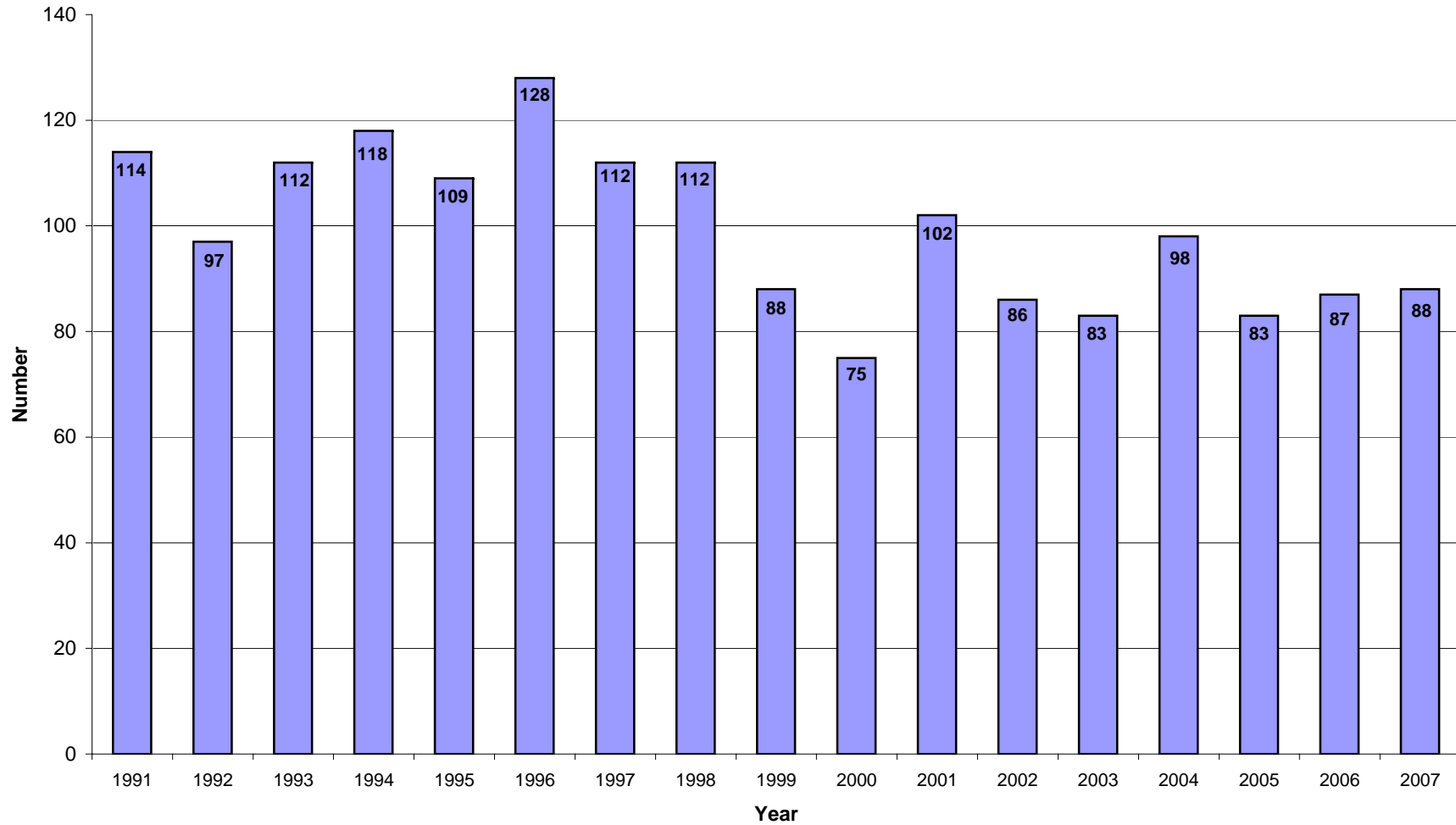

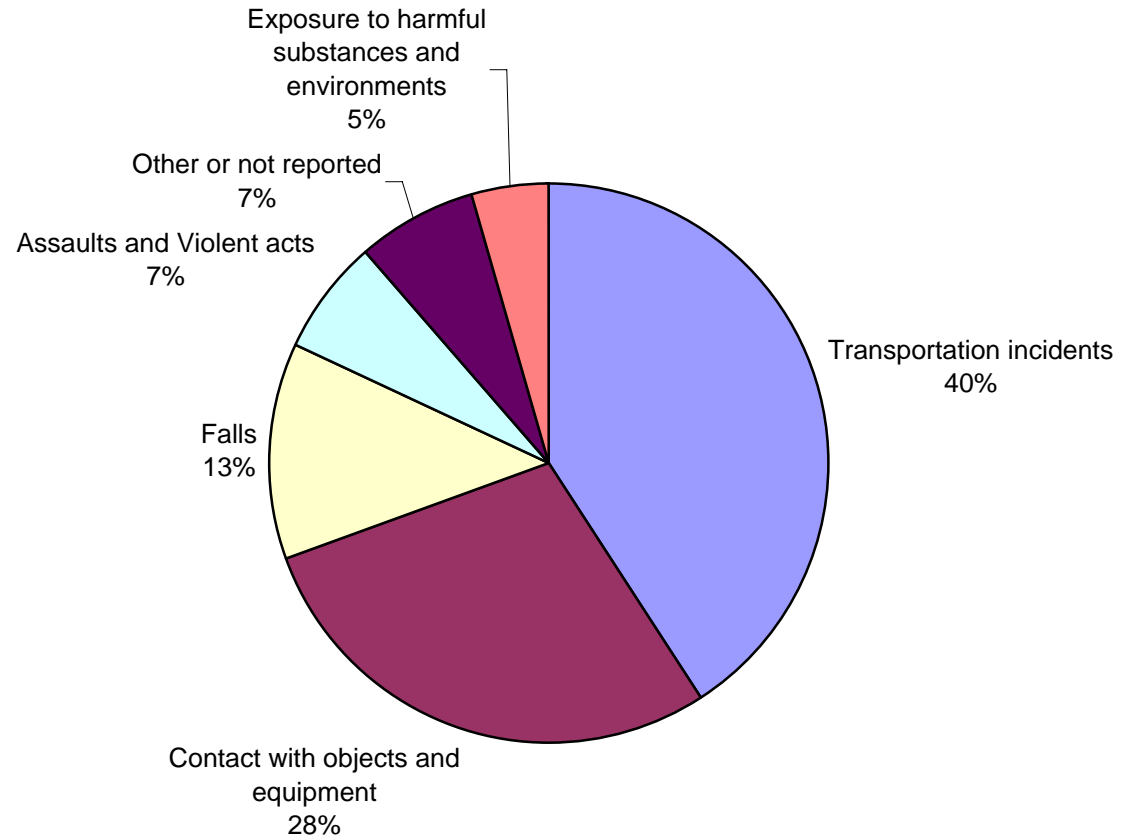

Number of fatal occupational injuries, Washington, 1991-2007

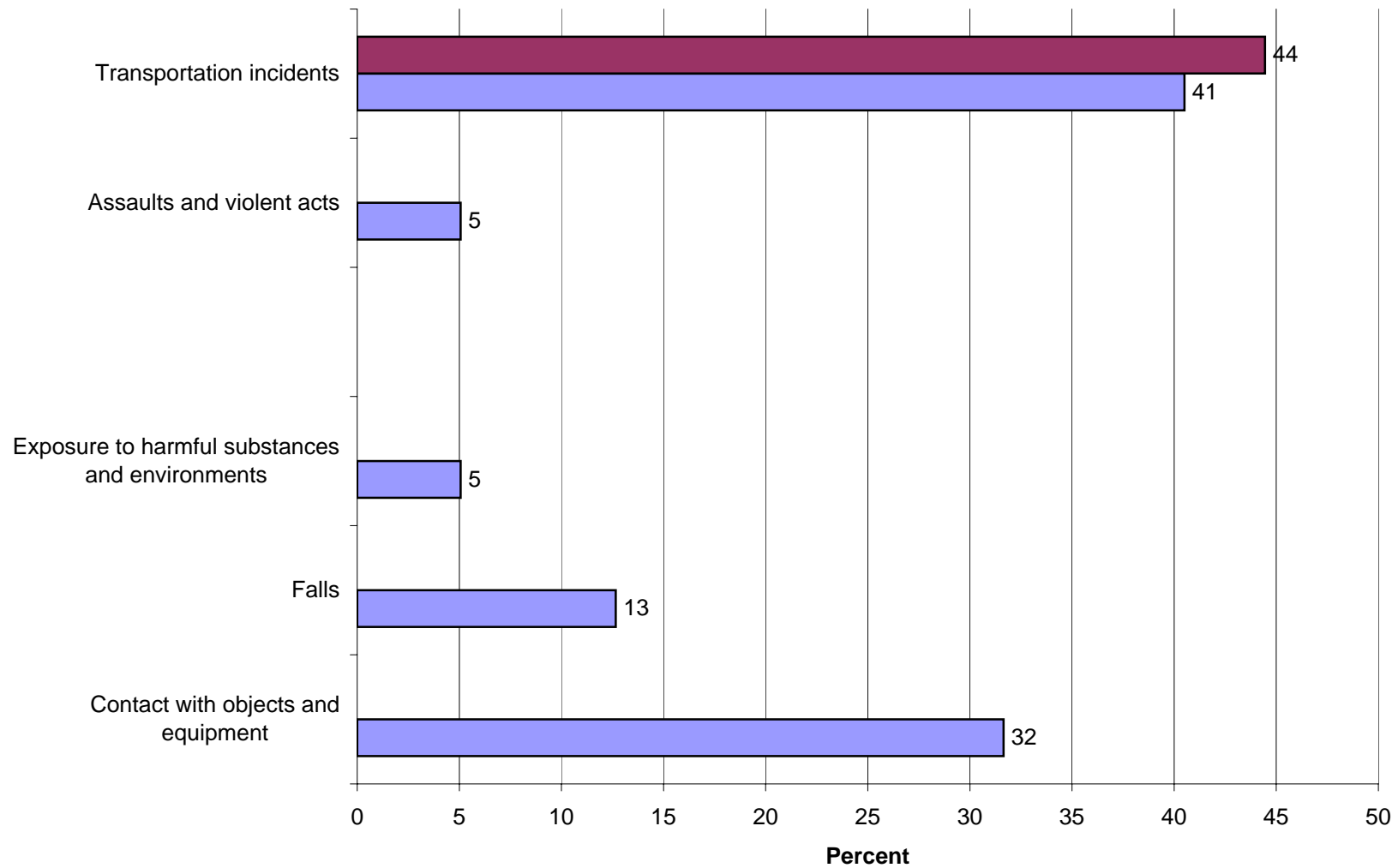

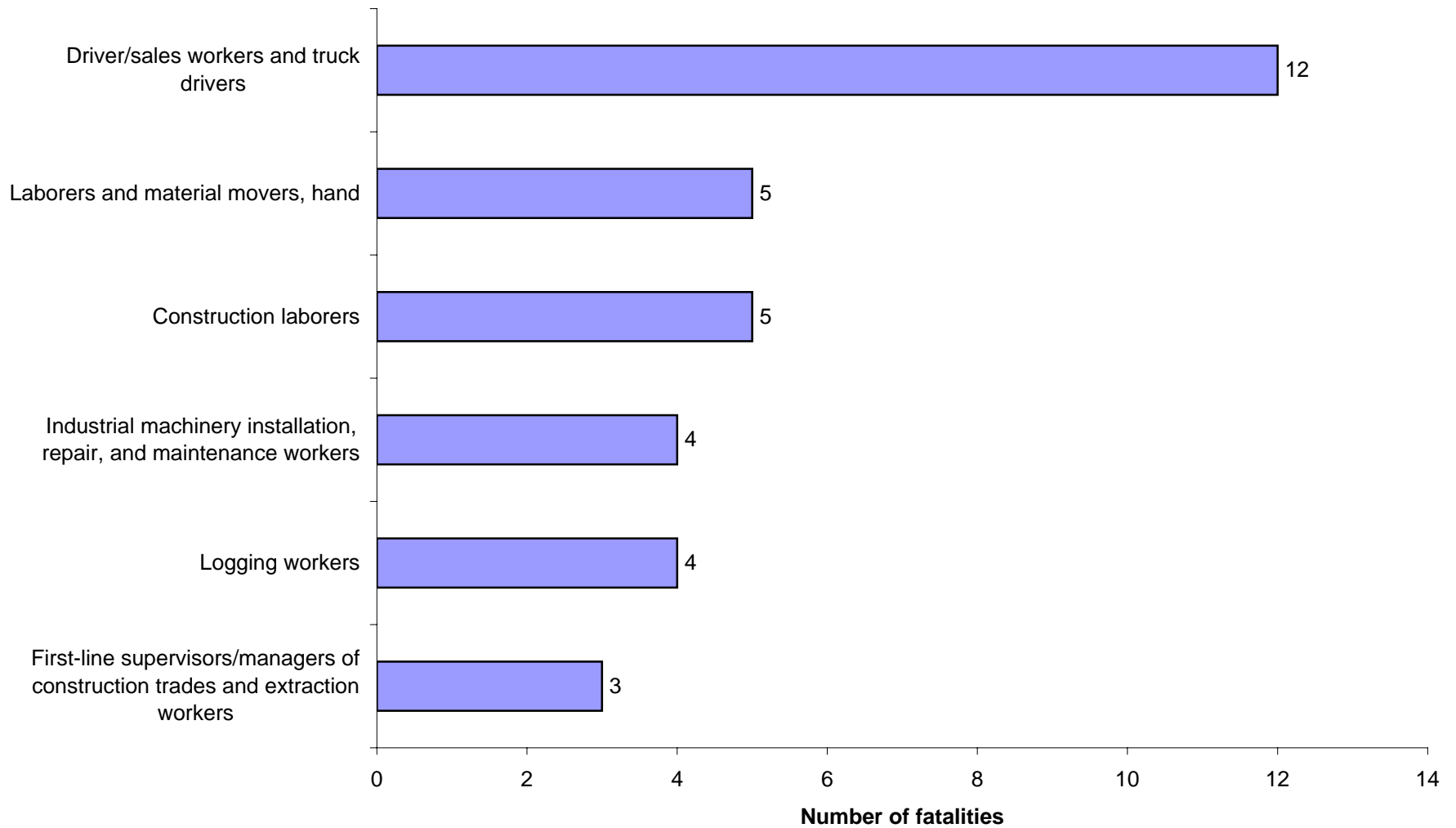
Workplace fatalities by event or exposure, Washington, 2007, all ownerships (88 Total fatalities)



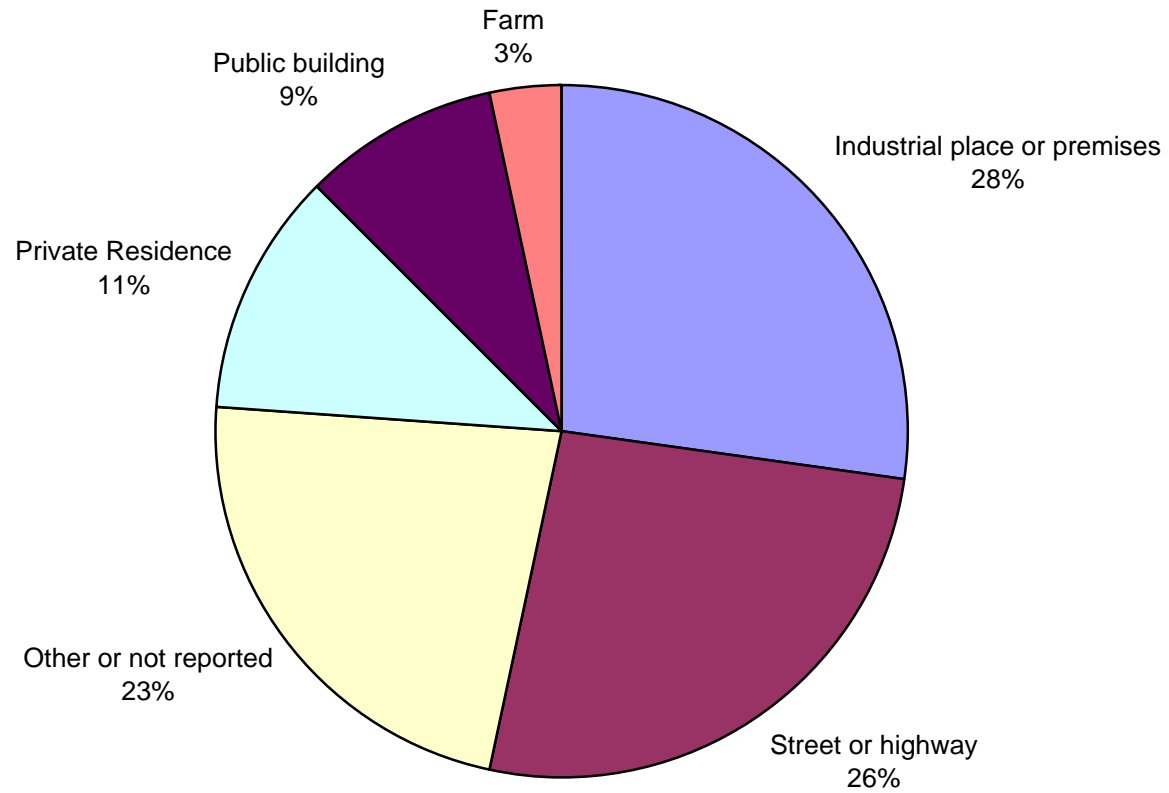
Fatality work injuries varied between men and women, 2007, Washington, (79 men, 9 women)
