



Washington, 2009 & 2010**





Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses by Size class, Washington, 2005-2010




**Industries with the highest incidence rates

Washington, 2010**




Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, all ownerships, 2003-2010

Washington, private industry, 2003-2010**




Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, state and local governments, 2003-2010



Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, state government, 2003-2010




Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, local government, 2003-2010





Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses by Ownership and Case Type, Washington, 2010





Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses in Hospitals (NAICS 622) by Ownership and Case Type, Washington, 2010






Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, all industries, 2010


Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, private industry, 2010
