


Martha Araceli Benavides, 44, Lab Technician


Martha Araceli Benavides, 44, Técnico de laboratorio


John F. Knighten, 45, Firefighter


Michael Rongey, 33, Cell Tower Climber


Robert W. Schmidt, 50, Firefighter/Engineer/EMT

WHEREAS, a memorial ceremony provides all Washingtonians an opportunity to pay tribute to fallen workers and rededicate ourselves to workplace health and safety;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jay Inslee, Governor of the state of Washington, do hereby proclaim April 29, 2014 as

Worker Memorial Day

in Washington, and I urge all people in our state to join me in this important observance.
