




Incidence rates per 100 full-time workers for total nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses, Washington and All United States, 2003-2006




**Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction

Washington, private industry, 2003-2006**




Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, all ownerships, 2003-2006




Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, state and local governments, 2003-2006





Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, local government, 2003-2006




Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, private industry, 2006


Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, all industries, 2006


Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, state and local government, 2006





Washington, 2006**




**Incidence rates per 100 full-time workers for

Washington, 2005 & 2006**




