



## Incidence rates per 100 full-time workers for total nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses by major industry sector, Washington, 2008 & 2009




## Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses by Size class, Washington, 2004-2009





Washington, 2009**




### Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, all ownerships, 2003-2009




### Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, private industry, 2003-2009



### Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, state government, 2003-2009




### Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, local government, 2003-2009





### Cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction incidence rates, injuries and illnesses, Washington, state and local governments, 2003-2009





## Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses by Ownership and Case Type, Washington, 2009





## Incidence rates of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses in Hospitals (NAICS 622) by Ownership and Case Type, Washington, 2009






## Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, private industry, 2009


## Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, all industries, 2009
