It opens doors to family wage careers, creates pathways for people who might not otherwise have had them, and builds a skilled workforce that our communities and our industries rely on. Washington State is a leader in Apprenticeship.

CORRESPONDENCE: Apprenticeship Program Manager, Peter Guzman presented and certified the January 1 – March 31, 2025 Correspondence Log as true and correct summary of communications sent and received by the Department. The council members approved and moved to accept the Correspondence Log as presented. M/S/C to approve.

SPECIAL REPORTS: RSI Survey Report, Jordan Shepherd reported the Department was charged with surveying the Registered Apprenticeship community for RSI delivery to include the financial components of it. Jordan thanked the programs which had a 92 percent participation rate. 60 percent of Registered Apprentices participate in programs where the program has Community Technical College (CTC) apprenticeship but the program deliverers all of the RSI. 23 percent of apprentices participate in programs where the CTC is directly involved in the delivery of RSI whether it is going to the interpreted as instruction or use of facilities.

Oregon State Apprenticeship and Training Council

Katrina Johnson reported on their efforts to engage on the revisions to the Tri-State Apprentice Reciprocity Agreement. She reported Commissioner Stephenson also appointed a Rules and Policy Subcommittee to engage with their Apprenticeship Division as they clear the backlog of Compliance Reviews. For the first quarter of this year they had 10,004 active apprentices earning while they learned skills in over 160 occupations. 11 percent are women, 24.7 percent are people of color and 6.6 percent are veterans. Oregon programs registered 488 new apprentices in the first quarter.

State Board for Community and Technical Colleges

Dr. Genevieve Howard thanked Jeremy Clevenger for his commitment and participation on the RSI Committee and welcomed Racheal Geyer to the committee. The Fall of 2024 16 of the 34 colleges reported apprenticeship enrolment. Implementation of the Washington College Grant for Apprentices continues to move forward, with the state Board and partnering with WSAC. Six pilot colleges continue to work together to develop the online application for the Washington College Grant for Apprentices.

U.S. DOL, Office of Apprenticeship

Washington State Apprenticeship Coordinators Association

Jeremy Clevenger gave his report. He discussed the importance at the Coordinators meetings of attending the multiple different meetings that the council has, subcommittees, Related Supplemental Instruction (RSI) & Compliance Review Retention Subcommittee (CRRS). Regional Pre-Apprenticeship Collaboration (RPAC) is looking for updates from stakeholders so they know who to send applicants to for worker's needs. The Washington State Labor Council gave a presentation about unemployment for apprentices. Chair Riker thanked Jeremy for the phenomenal job he has done and welcomed Chair Geyer.

Washington Student Achievement Council

David Davis reported they're up to 40 Program Sponsors who have access to the Washington Grant for Apprenticeships. For the current fiscal year, awards of a total of \$7.4 million, awarded over 2,000 apprentices and over \$726,00 for the Washington Bridge Grant supporting 1,454 apprentices. For the Native American Apprenticeship Program, they have awarded \$960,000 in block grants with an anticipated impact to 233 apprenticeships. The Washington Jobs Initiative have placed more than 800 participants in good jobs, with 448 participants in Registered Apprenticeship. Kris Mason reported currently there are over 1,000 veterans so far actively participating in On-The-Job-Training (OJT) and Apprenticeship programs throughout the state.

Workforce Training and Education Coordinating Board

Andrew Lederman shared the 2025 Matrix poster which is the annual report that highlights employment and earnings results for many of the Washington's largest Workforce programs. This year's report shows a \$1.6 billion investment across 23 programs. For the apprenticeship program there is an 84 percent employment rate, annual earnings of \$76,500. The return on investment is \$7.80 to \$1.00 dollar.

Secretary, Washington State Apprenticeship and Training Council

Celeste Monahan, reported the Apprenticeship Council nomination period has closed for the vacant Public member position and they plan to have a recommendation for the Director by June. National Apprenticeship day is April 30. The apprenticeship system supported 14,409 active apprentices, issued 1,283 new registrations and 614 completion credentials.

Peter Guzman announced his retirement with his last official day in the office as July 21st. Peter started his career at Rebound, an activity of the Seattle Building & Constructions trades Council as a Hispanic outreach worker and ends his career as a Program Manager for Washington State Department of Labor and Industries.

He said in the coming months the Department be proactively reaching out to not only councilmembers but stakeholders to discuss potential solutions that are viable. Prior to the July meeting he anticipates at least two platforms will be ready to have members appointed.

Brittany Craighead reported a few highlights of the current activities regarding the proposed updates with the current Tri-State Reciprocal Agreement. The Department engaged in stakeholdering, collected comments and feedback. Written feedback/comments will be accepted through May 26.
